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## **TEXAS GARDEN CLUBS, INC. AWARDS BROCHURE**

This brochure lists awards offered by National Garden Clubs, Inc., Texas Garden Clubs, Inc. and South Central Region. Member Garden Clubs, Councils, and Affiliates are encouraged to apply for awards. 1995-97 NGC Awards, Chairman Gerry St. Peters explained that "Receiving a prestigious NGC award is one of the highest honors to be achieved. Recognition creates pride and encourages members to further their efforts." The excellent work of our clubs and members should receive recognition by fellow members at District, State and National levels.

To be eligible to apply, garden clubs must be federated with Texas Garden Clubs, Inc. and Councils/Forums/Federations and Plant Societies must be Affiliate Members. Individuals must be members of a federated garden club.

Most awards are submitted through the Districts for competition, and if eligible the awards are forwarded to State. If a National Award is offered and the award is eligible, then the award will be forwarded to National Chairman for further competition.

The emphasis of this brochure is to encourage clubs to compete for awards - for competition brings spirit and pride and to prepare those eligible awards to meet the requirements for State and NGC awards.

**National Garden Clubs Rules and Awards** are published in the September/October issue of *The National Gardener* in odd-numbered years; changes and/or corrections are published in the even-numbered years. Changes in rules and award requirements published in *TNG* will take precedence over this Awards Brochure.

**Texas Garden Clubs** also offers some awards exclusively for our organization. These state awards are titled with "TGC" and are found in this Awards Brochure. Changes in TGC awards are published in *The Lone Star Gardener*; revisions are made available from TGC Headquarters and can be added to brochure. Separate brochures available from TGC Headquarters: Club Programs, Club Ratings, Flower Shows, Scrapbooks, and Yearbooks, are more detailed in preparing and judging these specific awards. Youth Awards are also covered in more detail in a separate brochure.

**South Central Region Awards** are applied for **separately**. The Awards and Rules are published in the summer edition of *The Communicator* and in this brochure. Changes in rules and award requirements published in *The Communicator* will take precedence over this Awards Brochure. The awards are submitted directly to the South Central Awards Chairman **before** the February 1 deadline. **All the SCR Awards have been place together in the last section of this brochure.**

# NATIONAL GARDEN CLUB AWARDS RULES

## 1. AWARDS YEAR

January 1 to December 31 annually. This applies to all projects submitted with application form. All awards may be presented annually, if merited, unless otherwise stated in awards description.

## 2. ELIGIBILITY

- a. Only National Garden Club members are eligible to apply for NGC awards. Members are: member garden clubs, groups and/or councils of member garden clubs, groups of member clubs, State Garden Clubs, NGC Regions, and individual members of garden clubs. Junior, Intermediate and High School Garden Clubs must be sponsored by a member garden club to be eligible for specific NGC awards. National Affiliate and Affiliate members are eligible to apply for certain awards (see this brochure).
- b. Dues to District and TGC must be current to be eligible for awards.
- c. When the same project is eligible for more than one award, submitting exact duplication of books of evidence is **not** acceptable. (Each award should be written with supporting data focused on that award.)

## 3. DEADLINES

- a. Unless otherwise stated in awards description, awards are submitted to District Chairman **to arrive by November 1.**
- b. Unless otherwise stated, eligible awards are submitted by District Chairman to corresponding State Chairman **to arrive by December 1.** (District Chairmen, do not delay. The State Chairman has very little time.)
- c. Unless otherwise stated, awards eligible for NGC awards are submitted by TGC Awards Chairman to TGC Awards/National Chairman by **December 15.**
- d. TGC Awards/National Chairman submits eligible awards to NGC Awards Chairman to arrive no later than **January 15.** (Awards received after judging deadline can not be considered.)

## 4. APPLICATION FORMS

All applications must be on current NGC forms obtained from the State Awards Chairman. The form will be signed by TGC President and TGC Awards Chairman if the award is judged as qualified to proceed on to National for further competition. One application form should be permanently attached to inside cover of the Book of Evidence and a duplicate form attached with paper clip. **Exceptions: Yearbooks:** firmly clip two application forms to the inside front cover; no envelope necessary. **Publications Awards:** one form attached to outside of envelope and one enclosed inside envelope.

## 5. NUMBER OF APPLICATIONS

Garden Clubs: one application for each size category (based upon membership) for each award may be submitted for evaluation to the NGC Awards Committee. State Garden Clubs: one application for any award category may be submitted for evaluation to the NGC Awards Committee. **Note: entry limitations on Awards: #20, #71-74 and Flower Show Achievement Awards #5 and #25.**

## 6. CATEGORIES BY SIZE

**Garden Club** applications shall be judged according to size determined by number of members on whom NGC and state dues are paid, including Active, Associate, Inactive, Honorary, etc.

Category A: Single member garden club

- i. small club                      29 members and under

- ii. medium club      30 – 99 members
- iii. large club      over 100 members

**State Garden Clubs** applications shall be judged according to size determined by number of members on whom NGC dues are paid, including garden club members, Affiliates, State Life Members, etc.

- i. small state      1999 members and under
- ii. medium state      2000 – 5999 members
- iii. large state      over 6000 members

**7. TROPHIES, MONETARY AWARDS, CERTIFICATES OF MERIT**

Trophies and/or monetary awards shall be awarded to highest scoring entry among all applicable categories. Trophies remain on permanent display at NGC Headquarters. The winner of a trophy or monetary award is determined from first place entries in each category. Certificates of Merit shall be presented to winners in each category. Awards and Certificates shall be presented at the NGC Convention, except Flower show Achievement Rosettes, which are sent directly to the State Awards Chairman.

**8. REQUIREMENTS FOR PREPARING A BOOK OF EVIDENCE**

- a. Label on outside cover: number and name of NGC award, category, name of club/s, city and state.
- b. Presentation: not to exceed 6 pages, front and back, for a maximum of 12 surfaces; pages may be enclosed in 6 plastic sheet protectors, pages back to back. Material must be attached to pages, no loose materials. Use 8 ½” x 11” paper and enclose in report cover or 2 pocket folder; no scrapbooks or oversized books. Exceptions are noted.
- c. Top of first page include number and name of NGC award, name of club/s, number members on whom NGC and state dues are paid (regular, honorary, life, associate).
- e. Written text: concise; covers all requirements in award description and Scale of Points for Achievement, Participation and Record.
- e. Record: photocopies are permitted; yearbook pages are not needed as documentation.
- f. No Title Page. No Table of Contents. No Summary is needed as it appears on NGC Application Form.
- g. When the same project is eligible for various awards, submitting exact duplication of books of evidence is not acceptable.

**10. ELIGIBILITY**

Eligibility categories to apply for awards as noted:

- A. Single member garden club
  - i. small club 29 members and under
  - ii. medium club 30 – 99 members
  - iii. large club over 100 members
- B. Group of member clubs (councils, districts, etc.)
- C. Individual garden club member
- D. State Garden Club
  - i. small state 1999 members and under
  - ii. medium state 2000 – 5999 members
  - iii. large state over 6000 members
- E. Affiliates
- F. Individual Affiliate member
- G. International Affiliate
- H. Individual IA member
- I. Region

**REQUIREMENTS FOR BOOK OF EVIDENCE**  
**All NGC and TGC Awards must meet these requirements**

1. **Label on outside cover:** number and name of NGC (or State) award, category, name of club/s city and state.  
**CARD (for TGC information only)** Prepare 3x5 card and **paper clip** to outside front cover of binder for judging and preparation of District and State Awards. This card will be removed if award is submitted to National. List following information:
  - Award Number/Name (and class if any) (ex. N-1 Civic Achievement)
  - Name of Club, City, District, Club Rating (Gold, Silver, Bronze, Green), Number of Members, Name & Address of Current President
  - Dates TGC and District dues paid
2. **Presentation:** not to exceed 6 pages, front and back, for a maximum of 12 surfaces; pages may be placed in top loading sheet protectors. Material must be attached to pages. Use 8 ½” x 11” paper and enclose in report cover or 2 pocket folder; no scrapbooks or oversized books. Exceptions are noted.
3. **Top of first page:** include number and name of NGC award, name of club/s, number of members on whom NGC and state dues are paid (regular, honorary, life, associate).
4. **Written Text:** concise; covers all requirements in award description and Scale of Points for Achievement, Participation and Record.
5. **Record:** photocopies are permitted; yearbook pages are not needed as documentation
6. **No Table of Contents** or summary needed. (Summary appears on Application form)
7. When the same project is eligible for various awards, submitting exact duplication of books of evidence is not acceptable.
8. The NGC application forms will be prepared by the TGC Awards/National Chairman not by the club. **One application form will be permanently attached to inside front cover of the book of evidence and duplicate form attached with a paper clip for easy removal.**

**TGC PROCEDURE FOR PREPARING BOOK OF EVIDENCE  
AND MAILING AWARDS**

1. **CARD** (for TGC information only): Prepare 3x5 card and **paper clip** to outside front cover of binder for judging and preparation of District and State Awards. This card will be removed if award is submitted to National. List following information.
  - Award Number/Name (and class if any) (ex. N-1 Civic Achievement)
  - Name of Club, City, District, Club Rating (Gold Silver, Bronze, Green), Number of Members, Name & Address of Current President
  - Dates TGC and District dues paid
2. The NGC application forms will be prepared by the TGC Awards/National Chairman not by the club. **One application form will be permanently attached to inside front cover of the Book of Evidence and duplicate form attached with a paper clip for easy removal.**
3. Submit award entries to appropriate District Chairman unless otherwise noted in awards description. Council/Forum/Federation and Districts send entries directly to appropriate TGC Chairman.
4. If your District does not have a Chairman that corresponds with each award, send your award to your District General Awards Chairman.
5. Do not hesitate to call or write your District or TGC Vice President/Awards for information. Please send a stamped envelope for the reply.
6. **POSTAGE:** Include enough postage for the award to be sent by the District Chairman to the State Chairman and postage for the State Chairman to send to the TGC/National Chairman if qualified. Do not send cash. Any unused postage will be returned. Enclose postage in an envelope with your club's name and paper clip to binder. (Please send smaller denomination stamps rather than one \$3.00 stamp.)
7. **RETURN OF AWARD:** Awards that were not eligible to be submitted for state competition will be returned to the clubs at the Spring District Conventions. Awards submitted for state and national competition will be returned to the District Directors at the Spring TGC Convention.
8. **TEXT OF AWARD:**
  - a. Make sure that the text and the photos show the extent of the club's work. Organize materials that tell story of project from beginning to end. Be descriptive, give word pictures of the project. Explain who, what, when, where, why.
  - b. In the text, address "Fulfillment", "Scope", "Prior Planning", "Benefit".
  - c. Give number of member participation in the project and how goals reached. Club participation is important; two members doing all of the work is not a club project.
  - d. Supporting data must be focused on this particular award. Cut news articles and photos neatly. Cut or arrange news articles where there will be no foldouts; underline or highlight key information in a lengthy article. OK to photocopy except for Publicity Press Book.
  - e. Include action photos of members with the community/youth/etc. Label the photos with who, when, where. (Members and Scout Troop #15 planting 50 trees at Hill Park, January 23). Make before/during/after photographs from same angle.
  - f. Neatness is important. Use even and liberal margins. Number the pages. Proofread carefully.
  - g. Attach photos with rubber cement; glue sticks hold paper but do not hold stiff photos well.

9. Follow all of the rules in preparing the Book of Evidence. Don't miss out on 1<sup>st</sup> place because you forgot required information.

## GUIDELINES FOR JUDGING AWARDS

1. Immediately upon receipt of awards, check to be certain each is entered in the correct category.
2. Secure a panel(s) of a minimum of 3 judges, some may be specialists in the field related to the award rather than all garden club members.
3. Be certain the panel understands the award rules, description, and Scale of Points. If entry is not worthy, award should be withheld. Clarify if there is a rule violation that removes the application from consideration.
4. Winners must be kept secret until after awards presentation.
5. Do not write on pages in Book of Evidence; use the comment sheet.
6. Do not deduct points for anything not specifically in the Scale of Points. If points are deducted for omission be sure omission was not inadvertently overlooked by the panel.
7. Comments are required and should encourage and educate. Start with complimentary remarks before explaining how application needed improvement. Give careful thought to wording; comments should help the club in sending in their next application. Explain why points are deducted.
8. The Standard System of Awarding is used:

First Place	90 or above	Second Place	85 or above
Third Place	80 or above	Honorable Mention	75 or above
9. Please, no tie scores. Only one First Place, one Second, one Third, then all awards scoring over 75 are awarded Honorable Mention. (ex. First Place could score 99, Second 93, Third 84, HM 81, HM 79. If there is only one entry with a score of 80, it would receive Third Place). If scores are too close, OK to allow ties on honorable mentions.
10. District Chairman: send **first place** entry in each size category to State Chairman and list all others that score 95 or above, on report form to State Chairman.

ii. medium club	30 – 99 members
iii. large club	over 100 members
11. Do not mail awards that are not eligible for state awards to state chairmen or TGC VP/Awards. Each District's procedure may vary; Books of Evidence and entries are usually returned to the member clubs at the District Spring Convention or by using the enclosed postage.
12. Do not mail awards that are not eligible for NGC awards to TGC/National Awards Chairman or TGC Vice President/Awards. TGC Chairmen bring the Books of Evidence to the TGC Spring Convention and they are placed in the Exhibits Room for members to see. At the conclusion of the convention, the awards are distributed to the District Directors to return to the member clubs.
13. **Deadlines** are important! Awards must be forwarded promptly from District to State as State Chairmen have little time to forward eligible entries to the TGC/National Awards Chairman.

**ADDITIONAL GUIDELINES FOR STATE CHAIRMEN JUDGING  
AWARDS ELIGIBLE FOR NATIONAL AWARDS**

1. **Observe the deadlines.** Entries must be mailed no later than December 15 to the TGC/National Awards Chairman! The TGC/National Awards Chairman must process and mail the awards to the NGC Awards Chairman no later than **January 3** to be assured of on-time arrival.
2. Upon receipt of award entry or Book of Evidence, double-check if application is entered in the correct category. The 3 x 5 card will be removed by the TGC/National Awards Chairman and a NGC Application will be stapled to the inside front cover.

## **NON-COMPETITIVE AWARDS**

### **AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE**

A non-competitive award presented by local garden clubs to businesses, industrial establishments, schools, youth clubs, civic organizations, etc. who are not affiliated with a garden club, for on-going or completed projects. Award Certificate #5234 may be obtained from NGC Member Services.

### **MEMBER AWARD OF HONOR**

May be awarded to one member in each region whose volunteer efforts during a period of five or more years, has made outstanding contributions to club and community, in one or more of the following areas: civic development, horticulture therapy, youth activities, conservation, landscape design, horticulture, floral design, or all around excellence.

Eligibility: any member of a State Garden Club, not currently a member of NGC Board of Directors. Entries are submitted to TGC Awards Chairman by January 1. TGC Awards Chairman forwards one entry to Regional Awards Chairman by February 1. Region forwards one entry to National Chairman by February 20. The eight Regional Winners will receive a NGC Certificate and be recognized in *The National Gardener*.

Obtain application and complete information from NGC Member Award of Honor Chairman.

## **CONTRIBUTING AWARDS**

An Award of Appreciation is offered for \$10.00 and above contribution. All donation checks are to be made payable to "Texas Garden Clubs, Inc." The deadline for contributions is February 1 (except Arbor Day). Send all monies to TGC Headquarters, 3111 Old Garden Road, Fort Worth, TX 76107-3498. Include: Club's Name, President's or Treasurer's Name and Address, and District Number. Specify fund/s. Memorial Donations: include Name and Address of family for acknowledgement of donation. Following the February 1 deadline, the Office Manager will notify District Director, appropriate State Chairman and State VP of Awards of contribution/s.

### **ARBOR DAY FUND**

An Award of Appreciation will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more to further promote Arbor Day Celebration held by Texas Garden Clubs, deadline January 15.

## **BOOK LISTINGS**

### **FRIENDSHIP BOOK**

An award will be presented to each club listing 100% members with State Friendship Book Chairman. A duplicate list with a check for \$1.00 per member is to be sent to TGC Headquarters.

### **GOLD & SILVER BOOKS**

An award will be presented to a club contributing \$50.00 for the Gold Book or \$25.00 for the Silver Book. Include name and address of individual being honored with check to TGC Headquarters.

### **PRESIDENT'S BOOK**

An award will be presented to all clubs honoring the club's president by contributing \$10.00 to this fund. The President's name will be listed in the book. Include name and address of president being honored with check to TGC Headquarters. Clubs that have listed all presidents since the club's federation with Texas Garden Clubs, Inc. will be eligible for an additional award - 100% Presidents Book by notifying TGC Presidents Book Chairman.

### **TGC HEADQUARTERS BIRDSEED FUND**

An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more to purchase birdseed for feeders at Headquarters in Fort Worth.

### **TGC LIBRARY AND LIBRARY FUND**

An award will be presented for contributions of a book for the TGC Library at Headquarters or for contributions of \$10.00 or more for fund to purchase books.

### **TGC SCHOLARSHIP FUND**

#### **separate check required**

Scholarships are available to college level students (Junior, Senior, or Postgraduate) enrolled in study of Horticulture, Floriculture, Landscape Design, Conservation, Forestry, Botany, Agronomy, Environmental and allied subjects. Only the interest earned may be used. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more.

### **INA BRUNDRETT SCHOLARSHIP FUND**

#### **separate check required**

Scholarship is available to college level students (Junior, Senior or Postgraduate) enrolled in the study of Horticulture, Floriculture, Landscape Design, Conservation, Forestry, Botany, Agronomy, Environmental and allied subjects. Only the interest earned may be used. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more.

### **FRANCES ELLIS SCHOLARSHIP FUND**

#### **separate check required**

Scholarship is available to college level students (Junior, Senior or Postgraduate) enrolled in the study of Horticulture, Floriculture, Landscape Design, Conservation, Forestry, Botany, Agronomy, Environmental and allied subjects. Only the interest earned may be used. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more.

### **TGC HEADQUARTERS ENDOWMENT FUND**

#### **separate check required**

The Endowment Fund was established as a source of income to maintain TGC Headquarters. Only the interest earned may be used. Donations to this fund are added to the permanent portion of this fund. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more.

### **SUE ANN DURRETT ENDOWMENT FUND**

#### **separate check required**

The Sue Ann Durrett Endowment Fund was established as a source of income to maintain TGC Headquarters. Only the interest earned may be used. Donations to this fund are added to the permanent portion of this fund. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more

### **BLASCHKE LANDSCAPE ENDOWMENT FUND**

#### **separate check required**

The Renee Dhossche Blaschke Landscape Endowment Fund was established as a source of income to maintain the landscaping at TGC Headquarters. Only the interest earned may be used. Donations to this fund are added to the permanent portion of this fund. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more.

### **NATIONAL LAND TRUST**

**ANIMAL REHABILITATION KEEP (ARK) – CORPUS CHRISTI** Non-Profit organization whose mission is the rescue of injured wildlife to be rehabilitated and returned to the wild if possible. Home to injured sea turtles, pelicans, dolphins, ducks, rabbits, etc. Located in Corpus Christie at the Texas Marine Science Institute. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more to this project.

**CROSS PLAINS TREE RESCUE:** Project initiated after a wild fire swept the town of Cross Plains, Texas destroying the town and its vegetation. This project is to provide trees and shrubs to this devastated area.

**KEYSTONE HERITAGE PARK – EL PASO** TGC has adopted Keystone Heritage Park as a conservation/environmental project. Keystone is a diminishing wetlands area adjacent to an archeological site of an ancient Native American village. The plans for the park include continued excavation of the village, restoration of the wetlands, replanting of native flora and restocking native crustaceans and fish. There will also be botanical gardens (desert, aquatic and riparian), establishment of wildlife rehabilitation release center, and educational opportunities for children and visitors. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more to this project.

**MARGARET SHARPE MEMORIAL ROSE GARDEN – HOUSTON** Located on the University of Houston Campus, this 4000 sq. ft. garden is in tribute of our long time member Margaret Sharpe, Rose Rustler, TGC Garden Club Woman of Year, Landscape Design Consultant, and President of the Houston Federation of Garden Clubs. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more to this project.

**NATURAL DISASTER** - Funds forwarded to National Garden Clubs, Inc. to be used to help our “Sister States” that have suffered a disaster following a tornado, hurricane, forest fire, flood and/or any other “natural disaster”. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more to this project.

**PENNY PINES** An environmental project working with the USDA Forest Service to purchase seedlings to replant after forest fires. The original program was begun in 1941 when \$6.80 would purchase enough seeds to plant one acre, “a plantation”. Today’s costs are much higher and an amount of \$68.00 has been used to symbolize the original program. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more to this project.

**RIO GRANDE WILDLIFE CORRIDOR** An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more to further local, state and national efforts to preserve habitat and wildlife resources in Lower Rio Grande Valley. The refuge will encompass some 107,500 acres within a four county area.

**RIVERSIDE NATURE CENTER** Located in Kerrville on the Guadalupe River, is a study and research center for students to learn about birds, butterflies and native Texas Habitat. Self guided trails of native Texas trees, wildflowers, grasses and cacti are labeled for identification and study. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more to this project.

**THE NATURE CONSERVANCY OF TEXAS** An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more. As a National Land Trust project, Nature Conservancy of Texas protects diverse areas: Clymer Meadow, Sandylands Preserve, Barton Creek, Mad Island, Dolan Falls, Chihuahua Woods, Davis Mountains and others within the state. Donations are necessary to purchase and maintain land and wildlife corridors.

## **WORLD GARDENING**

**BROOKWOOD COMMUNITY** TGC has adopted The Brookwood Community, in the Houston area, as a State Garden Therapy Project. Brookwood is a community for functionally disabled adults, organized to provide citizens campus housing, an opportunity for development of productive job skills, experience in contributing to self-sufficiency, and social and spiritual growth. Brookwood is self-supporting; through worksite training, citizens learn vocational skills to generate operating revenue for their community. Garden Club volunteers in the Houston area assist in horticulture/greenhouse training. Greenhouse grown plants and handcrafts produced at Brookwood are retailed in local stores providing further financial support. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more to this project.

**CAMP TYLER FOUNDATION** Camp Tyler Foundation is a 287 acre forest and prairie land with 1.5 miles of lakefront, 7 ponds, and a residential capacity of 128. This hands-on learning center specializes in teaching science and mathematics to fifth grade students. Students experience what it is like to be a field scientist. Students who participate in Camp Tyler science and mathematics programs radio track turtles, P.I.T. tag salamanders, and

collect macro-invertebrates. They learn mark and recapture techniques and use GIS/GPS technology. Camp Tyler is a 501(c)(3) organization that stimulates the imagination, develops a curiosity about life and creates an environment to share discoveries about our world. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more.

**MARBRIDGE FARMS** Located in Austin, this is an adult care facility for the physically and mentally challenged with training programs for young adults and long-term residential care for mature adults and complete licensed nursing care for the retirement years. Work training programs, vocational training and activities, to reach the maximum potential of each resident are employed. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more.

**SEEDS FOR LIFE** Is a joint project between Texas Garden Clubs, Inc., Instituto Tecnológico de Mazatenango and SOS Guatemala to provide seeds to the needy and teach them how to plant, cultivate and harvest those seeds. An award will be presented for contributions of \$10.00 or more.

## SLIDE AND VIDEO AWARDS

**T-90-B SLIDE PROGRAM** An Award Certificate will be presented to an individual, club, group of clubs, or District for a slide program on any phase of gardening or related activity. Must be at least 30 minute program of original 35 mm slides or first quality duplicates. Program must have at least 36 slides. Slides must be numbered in pencil. Include two copies of commentary, numbered to correspond with slide numbers, typed on 8 ½ x 11 paper. Categories: 1) Floral Design, 2) Birds, 3) Gardens, 4) Horticulture, 5) Landscapes, 6) Miscellaneous (National or State Headquarters and programs for new Garden Clubs), 7) Wildflowers, 8) Garden Therapy (Youth/Handicapped/Nursing Home), 9) National and State Parks.

**T-90-C VIDEO PROGRAM** Video programs may be purchased and donated through TGC Radio/TV/Video Chairman from “Videos That Need Donors” list, available with SASE from TGC Radio/TV/Video Chairman or Headquarters.

Enclose \$3.75 with donated program, payable to TGC Radio/TV/Video Chairman for packaging and shipping of program to Headquarters. Include card with required information (Club, District #, President’s Name & Address, etc.) The TGC Radio/TV/Video Chairman will notify the District Director, TGC Vice President/Awards, and Club Rating Chairman of program donation. Credit for donation may be taken toward Silver/Gold Club Rating.

**RENTAL INFORMATION** Slide and video programs may be rented from Headquarters.

## **CLUB RATINGS**

Club Ratings measure the quantity and quality of a club's projects and activities. Club Rating is considered when applying for many awards. Garden Club of the Year is awarded by rating.

Club Rating Application is available from TGC Headquarters for \$2.00 plus \$1.00 postage. Completed application is enclosed in two-pocket theme binder with yearbook or yearbooks, which cover calendar year. If submitting two yearbooks, mark "A" and "B" and when referring to yearbook pages indicate A and B in text. Paper clip 3 x 5 card with state information to cover.

### **GREEN CLUB RATING**

No application is required.

### **BRONZE CLUB RATING**

No application is required. Club must:

1. Hold at least seven programs annually on gardening or related subjects, which reflect objectives of TGC and NGC.
2. Have one authoritative speaker annually on some phase of garden related work (plant specialist, horticulturist, nurseryman, floral designer, Flower Show Judge, landscape specialist, Landscape Design Consultant, Garden Study or Environmental Consultant)
3. Publish a yearbook, handmade or professionally printed.
4. Have bylaws, which comply with TGC Bylaws, based on Roberts Rules of Order.
5. Have annual informative display open to guests. May be Standard Flower Show or Horticulture, Design, or Specialized Plant Display. Display, if judged, should meet requirements in Handbook for Flower Shows.

### **SILVER CLUB RATING**

Clubs must apply annually using Club Rating Application. Silver Rating requires at least 200 points earned in four sections.

### **GOLD CLUB RATING**

Clubs must apply annually using Club Rating Application. Gold Rating requires at least 400 points earned in all sections. Without a Standard Flower Show, a Gold Rating requires 500 points earned in all sections.

### **TGC AWARDS OF EXCELLENCE**

An award will be presented to the Gold Club with the most points earned.

An award will be presented to the Gold Club that averages the most points per member.

An award will be presented to the Silver Club with the most points earned.

An award will be presented to the Silver Club that averages the most points per member.

4. **DEADLINE:** Entries must be received on or before February 1 (unless otherwise stated or required by NGC)

6. Your club must apply. No award will be given without an entry prepared according to SCR Rules.
