

IRS 990 N - IRS requires all garden clubs, affiliates and councils included in Texas Garden Clubs' group exemption list for 501(c)(3) tax exempt status to file Form 990N online between June 1 and October 15. Annual filing assures your club's tax exempt status remains in force. Clubs that do not file for three consecutive years will have their tax exempt status revoked by IRS. Reinstatement of tax exempt status is expensive and not guaranteed. Contact your District Director or TGC headquarters for assistance. Awards - Most awards should be to your District Committee Chair or your District Awards Chair to arrive by Nov 1. Most entries (called Book of Evidence) are limited to three pages, so be sure that your club writes a report of at least one of your successful projects. Refer to the NGC web page for a list of awards, http://www.gardenclub.org/awards/awards-list.aspx, and for the new Application Form. Follow the examples given and be recognized for your accomplishments.

Dragonfly - Fantastic garden helpers because they eat insect pests. As nymphs grow, they hunt larger insects, including mosquito larvae. Nymphs will molt or shed their skin 10 to 15 times before they are mature. A dragonfly is a very strong and good flyer, and can fly at speeds of up to 36 miles per hour. Can move in six different directions with ease and efficiency. With four wings operating independently, dragonflies can hover in one place for up to a minute. Dragonflies can also fly backward and sideways and change directions. Spread your wings; help your Garden Club develop; reach out to new members.
